**ELKTON MAN SENTENCED TO 40 YEARS
FOR SECOND DEGREE MURDER**

ELKTON – On Wednesday, November 12, 2025, Macio Delion Freeman pleaded guilty to Murder – Second Degree and was sentenced to forty years in an agreed upon plea by State and defense with the consent of the victim's representatives. Cecil County Circuit Court Judge William W. Davis, Jr. presided over the hearing. The sentence was the maximum penalty for Murder – Second Degree under Maryland law.

On November 2, 2024, officers from the Elkton Police Department responded to the area of Road 11 in Hollingsworth Manor in Elkton for the report of a car crash. The driver, Daryl Anthony Rozenski, was thought to be experiencing a medical emergency, but upon further investigation it was determined that Rozenski had been shot. During the investigation, detectives learned that two individuals had arranged a meeting with Rozenski with the intent of robbing him. When Rozenski tried to leave the meeting, the male individual, later identified as the Defendant, fired one shot from a handgun into Rozenski's departing vehicle. That single shot struck Rozenski's hip area and the injury he sustained presumably caused the later car crash. The meeting and the Defendant's actions were captured on surveillance and further corroborated by text messages obtained from the female suspect's cell phone.

State's Attorney James A. Dellmyer would like to commend Chief Carolyn Rogers and the Elkton Police Department for their thorough investigative efforts. This strong partnership with the Elkton Police Department ensures the safety of the Elkton community. "While nothing can restore the life lost in this senseless act, it is my sincere hope that the family of Daryl Rozenski begins to heal with the conclusion of this case," said State's Attorney Dellmyer.
